For 2015, we will continue with our contract to provide chaplain services and Christian programs at Lancaster County Prison. We have 7 paid staff and 12 regular badged chaplain volunteer. Annually, we respond to about 14,000 requests for services and/or contacts with about 1,000 inmates; 90% men, 10% women.



At Lancaster County Youth Intervention Center we have 3 part-time chaplains, plus about 20 church groups and area pastors minister to about 40-50 juvenile residents in detention and shelter care.



PLUS SFPM works with inmates being released to connect them with after/reentry ministries, raises funds through their annual benefit auction for various prison ministries, and provides speakers and education programs and training for local churches, businesses, and the community.




Focus On Finances

Income

2015 Budget: \$410,000

Expenses



For 2015, our board of directors approved a budget/financial plan that totals \$410,000. As you can see in the chart, about 1/2 of this (\$200,000) is needed in annual contributions. About 17% of all income is used for management, promotion and office/auction administration, leaving 83% to go directly to chaplains, literature, and in-prison and aftercare ministries.

You can also give to SFPM in other ways besides cash, such as estates, will distribution, and long term annuity and giving plans. We have regular contact with Mennonite Foundation/Everence financial advisors who offer helpful services.

Inmate Facts & Figures

PA State prisons normally house 50,000 inmates a day. County Prisons have another 32,000. PA Federal Prisons have about 12,000. That is not counting aftercare facilities of inmates.

It is at the county level where most inmates may be seeking Christ for the first time. Continue to pray for our chaplains and volunteers at Lancaster and the youth intervention center as they do their work.

Director's Report

I want to take a moment, as new director, to thank all the supporters of Support For Prison Ministries in financial gifts, prayer, and encouragement this past year. I never cease to marvel at the generosity that makes our work possible.

In regards to the inmate figures above, I share this brief experience. Camp Hill is the State prison that classifies prisoners, which will then go to other prisons for their permanent stay

in the system. I preach at Camp Hill on a regular basis. One time, as I was watching the new prisoners come in to the service, an elderly inmate (incarcerated since 1970) who was ushering made a comment I will never forget: "I look at that door and every week they keep coming in. You would think they would run out of people to incarcerate, but they never do." This continual influx of prisoners is the reason SFPM does what we do and that is to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.
